The overall Alaska commercial salmon harvest is in line with 2022, with some variation among species. Early season keta harvest volumes are up (+162%), while early sockeye and Chinook harvests are down through the end of Statistical Week 25 (which ended June 24 this year, but was June 18 in 2022). Pink salmon harvests are just starting to come in and the first expected coho harvests are still weeks away.

Early season keta harvest was driven by the Prince William Sound region, where the harvest is up 250% from 2022. The keta harvest is down 35% in the Alaska Peninsula. While the statewide keta catch is up, it is in line with the five-year average. For sockeye salmon, the Alaska Peninsula catch is down 62% from 2022, bringing the overall species year-over-year trend to -15%. Much more will be known about Alaska's sockeye salmon harvest in the next few weeks as Bristol Bay fishing ramps up.

Last week the 9th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals halted implementation of a lower court order in a lawsuit by Wild Fish Conservancy that would have prevented the Southeast summer Chinook troll fishery from opening on July 1. The summer troll fishery will now proceed as normal. The statewide Chinook projection has been raised by 100,000 fish to 242,000 fish, accordingly.
